

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Value of a diploma in business

THE University of Derby (UOD) 3+0 programme offered by the Department of Management Studies (DOMS) at the HELP Academy is a value proposition that many students aiming for an internationally recognised business degree from the UK find hard to resist.

The programmes offered are the BA (Hons) Accounting and Finance, BA (Hons) Business Management and the BA (Hons) **Business Management** (International Business)

These are supplemented by three diploma programmes and a certificate programme that provide a pathway for schoolleavers to enter the degree programmes. These are the Diploma in Accounting, Diploma in Business Management and Diploma in Marketing, and the Certificate in Business Management.

Admission to the Certificate in Business Management only requires one credit in any subject in SPM (or equivalent) or B6 for UEC. This gives a significant advantage, as students can subsequently proceed to any of the above diploma courses and complete a UOD degree in four and a half years

The UOD Business Management and International Business degrees are accredited by the Chartered Management institute (CMI, UK) which is dedicated to nurturing management and leadership skills in professionals. Students registered in these two programmes at DOMS receive an added bonus: they are given Affiliate Membership of CMI during their studies, and on completion they receive a Diploma in Management and Leadership from the CMI.

The Diploma in Management and Leadership (a CMI Level 5 qualification) is a comprehensive course designed to provide candidates all the skills and knowledge required of a senior manager; it normally takes 18 months to complete.

One big attraction of the UOD degrees at DOMS is the 10-day trip to the UOD campus in the UK provided by HELP as an essential part of the programme.

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SOCIAL entrepreneurship is on the rise, but not enough discussion has been raised around social entrepreneurs' wellbeing.

Social entrepreneurs are driven by a tenacity that goes beyond driving revenue and profit. The business serves a broader purpose: to address social or environmental issues that plague specific communities or societies, making it an appealing career choice for aspiring change agents.

Thus, they often work with vulnerable and marginalised individuals and communities, including refugees and victims of domestic violence.

It's a herculean task – social entrepreneurs witness extreme hardship and feel negative

emotions as a result. Their efforts to galvanise change is a long-term endeavour that cannot be achieved overnight.

The gruelling work means social entrepreneurs are ripe for burnout if they fail to care for their wellbeing. It also risks jeopardising the sustainability of their socially conscious business models.

Department of Management lecturer, University of Sheffield entrepreneurship lecturer Dr Andreana M Drencheva, Social Innovation Movement, and Impact Hub Phnom Penh.

It aims to support the development of change makers' attitudes, skills, and practices towards well-being, which can ultimately lead founders to create and sustain social ventures that catalyse positive social change.

The toolkit was developed after more than 40 in-depth interviews with social entrepreneurs.

Work-life boundaries can be non-existent for social entrepreneurs. Many activities occur outside of the typical 9amto-5pm weekday schedule.

"Many social entrepreneurs highlighted in our interviews that if they guit halfway, the harm to their beneficiaries would be greater than if they had done nothing to begin with," says Dr Au. "They continue to push themselves, and it can take a serious toll on their mental health.'

"We developed the Doing Good, Staying Well toolkit to address this issue based on the experiences of

social entrepreneurs who participated in our research. We used the toolkit for a six-week cohort-based well-being programme for social entrepreneurs at the end of last year," Dr Au says

At the core of the toolkit are the needs, experiences, lessons learnt, and practices shared; curated and developed by social entrepreneurs engaged in the social

entrepreneurship journey. These insights were supplemented by additional empirical evidence and academic frameworks to make the toolkit more robust and account for the diversity of experiences and needs.

The toolkit has three main sections: Committing to Social Entrepreneurship, Setting up the Foundation, and Navigating the Journey. The tools in each section aim to address specific needs that social entrepreneurs have at different stages of their journeys.

The final section is a bonus with quick ideas for improving the well-being of social entrepreneurs' teams.

The toolkit recognises that aspects of well-being intersect differently with the social entrepreneurship journey at different stages and the identities of social entrepreneurs.

Researchers note that each person is different, and each tool adds different benefits. As social entrepreneurs progress through the toolkit, they will be able to identify better which tools are more relevant and applicable to them and pay more attention.

The toolkit is unique, and the researchers have received much positive feedback and interest from the social entrepreneurship community in the Philippines and Vietnam. Malaysian and Cambodian social entrepreneurs have found the toolkit to be helpful. Researchers plan to create another version and explore how well it works for individuals across different contexts.

The research received funding from the Arts and Humanities Research Council (AHRC) and the Global Challenges Research Fund (GCRF) for the international project entitled "Changing The Story: Building Inclusive Civil Societies with, and for, Young People" led by the University of Leeds.
